1. In Emily Dickinson's "The Chariot" (Appendix) how does the categorization, rhyme and metrical feet affect the oral interpretation of the poem?
2. Agnes Moorehead, a renowned interpreter said, "... to be stimulated first of all yourself, and then to stimulate others by making the literature speak through you. Make the words you read leap out of the pages and become alive!"

Explain the above statement on the emotional involvement in the literature chosen for an oral interpretation.
3. The oral interpreter's role is primarily "presentational" rather than "representational". Discuss.
4. In the oral interpretation of children's literature such as "Three Billy Goats Gruff", why is there a need for precise characterization, contrast in voice level, tone, stress and pace?
5. Readers Theatre takes advantage of the presentational convention of allowing the audience to participate in the inner workings of a scene, in the same way a film allows audience participation by moving the camera in for close-ups. With the aid of a diagram, explain this Readers Theatre presentation technique, in a scene with two characters.

At Recess — in the Ring —
We passed the Fields of Gazing Grain —
We passed the Setting Sun —

Or rather — He passed Us —
The Dews drew quivering and chill —
For only Gossamer, my Gown —
My Tippet — only Tulle —

We passed before a House that seemed
A swelling of the Ground —
The roof was scarcely visible —
The Cornice — in the Ground —

Since then — 'tis Centuries — and yet
Feels shorter than the Day
I first surmised the Horses' Heads
Were toward Eternity —

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
